We cannot wait to talk face-to-face again, but know that regardless of the circumstances, we're here for you.



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New Class Series Can Help You Master Aging

Missoula Aging Services is pleased to announce that we are the first in the area to offer a new, innovative ten-class health and wellness program to people 55+. The Aging Mastery Program® (AMP) was developed by the National Council on Aging (NCOA) and has been successful at helping older adults build their own playbook for aging well.

The core curriculum covers ten topics: Navigating Longer Lives, Exercise, Sleep, Healthy Eating and Hydration, Financial Fitness, Advance Planning, Healthy Relationships, Medication Management, Community Engagement and Falls Prevention.

We are currently recruiting 15 adults, ages 55+ to participate in the first educational program.

Reduced and no cost tickets available. AARP Montana is generously covering the registration costs for the first 15 people registered.
